

Orchard Hills Elementary School Community Council Meeting Minutes

November 16, 2022

3:45- 5:05

- All committee members were present (Jessica Sharp, Emily Giles, Kristy Openshaw, Krissi Tanner, Shelby Craig, Keri Huntsman, Alene Larsen)

- Emily Giles motioned to accept the minutes in September. Kristy Openshaw seconded the motion.

1 - Review Plan for this year & data from last year (if available)

- 2 goals - 1 reading, 1 math
 - Anything else that is needed can be embedded within these 2 goals
- Reading Goal: "By the end of the 2022-2023 school year, the percent of students in grade K-3 performing on grade level or making typical progress in reading will increase by 1%."
 - There are 5 action steps that will be implemented
- Math Goal: "By the end of the 2022-2023 school year, the percentage of students in grades 3-5 performing on grade level or making typical progress in reading will increase by 1%."
 - There are 5 action steps that will be implemented
- Budget distribution: Technicians (tier 2), supplies for interventions (tier 1 & 2), equipment, books, professional development, substitutes, rewards and supplies for PBIS
- Looked at a data chart for Acadience reading scores for K-5 (even though we are only looking at K-3) to show how we will be analyzing if our reading goal has been met at the end of the year.
- Looked at a rise data chart to show how we will be analyzing if our math goal has been at the end of the year.
- Discussed progress monitoring -
 - Teachers are required to progress monitor red students twice a month and yellow students once a month (this is determined using Acadience scores from the BOY).
 - Teachers were trained on how to progress monitor at the end of October using students. This was very beneficial.

2- Safety - Update on pick up plan

- It appears to be going well. Teachers seem to be navigating it well.
- The signs have helped and made communication easier.
- There is an issue with cars not wanting to go left, due to construction - it has been one lane for a little while and it has complicated things.

3- 2023-24 Trustlands Plan

- In the interest of time we will work on next year's plan when we meet in January.

4- Budget

5 - Superintendent's School Community Council

- Nebo is in the top 400 in numbers for population
- Nebo has 37,000 students
- Pay raise and cost of living raise went up 6.75%
- District has their own doctor's office, base prescriptions are \$5, fitness facility for faculty
- All day kindergarten: The problem is staffing, not space to do all day kindergarten. The state passed a law in the spring and has funding, but it is limited. Nebo applied and gave a proposal - we qualified, but our individual school did not.
- Period products: It is state law to provide period products in bathrooms.
- School safety: Committed, but trying to strike a balance. One idea is to take out all the windows - not conducive to a learning environment and the other measures have shown that weapons are still getting past the security measures. They are concerned about the information that is being discussed on social media, because it shows where our weaknesses are. The district is in the process of figuring out the most effective solution to this issue.
- Library Books HB 374: pornography - District is asking teachers to be critical and review the books that are placed on a shelf. The removal process is tedious and it opens up dialogue that is difficult to agree upon because of various points of view.
